Obituary— Bill Blackledge MBE 4th July 1942 - 14th April 2020

Bill was born on the 4th July 1942 and he lived in Newton-le-Willows with his family. After leaving school he completed his pre-college practical experience at Winwick Hospital near Warrington. He commenced his horticultural training at the John Innes Institute and then he successfully graduated from Silsoe College in Bedfordshire in 1966.

His first and only employment position was at Lancaster University, where he worked until his retirement in 1997 - over 30 years of dedicated service. He worked latterly as Superintendent, managing the estate and



additionally working with eminent professors in world recognised research activities.

He met his wife, Margaret at a dance at Morecambe Pier! Their romance blossomed and they were married within the year. Peter and Stephen were born, and Lancaster became their home. Bill was a family man and also had many interests, not just his love of horticulture and how it can change peoples lives, but he also loved music, both classical and popular bands such as REM and many others.

Bill was a panellist on BBC Radio 4 Gardeners' Question Time and also a part of the BBC Radio Lancashire team for many years. He was their 'Gardening Guru' and he delivered hundreds of lectures and presentations throughout the North West. The BBC team considered him to be an integral part of their family and a lovely, lovely man.

Many years ago, Bill supported the "Keep Britain Tidy" campaign and when this initiative came to an end he was at the forefront of North West in Bloom, working in partnership with the Royal Horticultural Society (RHS) in London. He was chairman for many years and ensured the North West was represented at all RHS events. Tributes have been received from throughout the RHS, the 16 regions and nations acknowledging his tremendous positive influences on everyone he met.

Bill had a team of over 30 judges and administrative staff who ensured the North West In Bloom and Its Your Neighbourhood entries were judged each year. He loved the annual Awards Ceremonies where everyone received recognition for making the North West "Cleaner and Greener' – he made people feel loved and valued and did this with effortless style. He had a wonderful smile, a hearty laugh full of compassion and support.

Many of the groups and communities have so many lovely memories of Bill. They say he encouraged groups and individuals with warmth and generosity. He encouraged everyone – young and old

"He wore his expertise lightly and offered his skills kindly".

As many people know it was for his "Outstanding" contribution to the North West that Bill received his MBE at the Palace. He always said that he received it on behalf of everyone involved in North West in Bloom.

Bill was a tremendous individual, who really made a difference to everyone he met. He and Margaret had many friends locally, throughout the North West and the United Kingdom. Margaret and her family are very appreciative of all the cards and messages they have received and she has said there will be an event and an opportunity to celebrate Bill's life – when details are available; these will be shared.

Light relief

Do you know in which century the first watering can appears?

A clue is that it was made from clay and had holes in the bottom. The spout didn't appear until many centuries later in the 17th century!

Where was the first hoe designed?

The clue is that it was in 4000BC, so has been around for quite some time! It had a short wooden handle; the head was made from flint. It was adapted in the 19th century to have a long handle. At around about the same time, there appeared three main types of hoe. A Draw Hoe, a Dutch or Thrust Hoe and a Spanish Hoe.

Bonfires aren't just for Bonfire Night?

Can you name 2 reasons that bonfires are beneficial in the garden? A clue is that one of them relates to Pest and Diseases.

Did you know that plants can tell you if you have a deficiency in your soil? What does Chamomile indicate that your soil might be deficient in?

Of course, it also has lots of herbal benefits too, from tinctures to a nice drink, to treating hay-fever and many other ailments and it can even be found in cosmetics!

Potatoes were traditionally used as a way to clear the ground of weeds but, what other cultural control is it used for in horticulture?

The clue might be clay soil.
